GENERAL RULES AND POLICIES

Special rules pertaining to individual horse shows are in addition to General Rules.

- 1. Open Class & FFA Horses Stall fee is \$6.00 per box. Class fee is \$2.00 per lot; FFA fee is \$2.00 per lot.
- 2. Khana horses \$5.00 per class; no stall fee.
- 3. No exhibitor may show more than 2 entries per lot.
- 4. Entries are limited to space available and stalls are to be allocated under the jurisdiction of the superintendents of the department.
- 5. Horses may be required to be presented to the Fair Veterinarian for

inspection.

- 6. Must submit a copy of current negative coggins for each horse.
- 7. Exercise area and time to be designated by the Superintendents.
- 8. Please refrain from riding your horse in the barns, in front of the barns, or any other place where people are afoot.
- 9. Stalls **must** be cleaned before leaving the fair.
- In barn horses exit east end of the barn. On deck performance horses, stay on the east side of the arena and enter the south door of the arena.
- 11. Failure to comply with the above rules may result in withheld premiums.

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

MUST BE TESTED BEFORE THE FAIR OR HAVE A CERTIFICATE OF ORIGIN.

All chickens and turkeys must be officially tested for typhoid and pullorum diseases and found negative within 90 days prior to the fair or originate from parent stock classified within 12 months of fair as U.S. pullorum-typhoid clean.

A statement on official forms showing test results as conducted by approved testing agents or certification of origin, together with identification of each bird by band number will be required.

The New American Standard of Perfection will govern the judge in all varieties recognized therein.

Entries in all poultry classes shall consist of single specimens and trios. Trios shall consist of one male and two females of the same variety. Single entries are not permitted to enter trios.

All birds will be judged by comparison.

The following premiums will be paid in each variety of the following classes: 1-10. Classes 11-14 only Lot 1 and 2. No premium paid on out-of-county poultry. Grand Champion Ribbon for single bird or trio.



- 1. The FFA exhibit will be governed and controlled under the general rules and regulations pertaining to the fair, such as health and sanitation, entries and other which apply in general.
- 2. Exhibits shown in FFA must be owned by the exhibitors, either in individual or in partnership.
- 3. Livestock shown can be either registered or high grade stock, but must be of pure breeding. Market classes may be crossbreds.
- 4. Entries are open only to those members of FFA in Martin County. A member may show if they have not reached the age of 21 and their dues are paid.
- 5. An exhibitor may show two entries in one lot (livestock only) but only one first prize will be awarded in each lot. One entry will be allowed in group lots.
- 6. The entry fee shall be \$2.00 per head for cattle and horses, \$1.00 per head for swine and sheep and \$0.50 for poultry and rabbits. There will be an \$8.00 per head bedding charge for beef cattle if not dual shown in a 4-H class.
 - 7. In case of illness, a member may substitute another member to

show his entry with the approval of the department superintendent.

- 8. Breeding animals for beef, dairy, sheep and swine must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1 of the current fair year.
 - 9. Market animals must be owned and fed for at least 60 days.
- 10. The judge shall decide the merit of each entry and make all awards.
- 11. All FFA entries should be given to your FFA advisor by August 5th.
- 12. FFA horse exhibitors are not required but encouraged to wear a helmet. A minimum of a short sleeve shirt, jeans, western hat or helmet and boots are required.


